I am extremely proud to advise members that the Royal Life Saving Society Australia New South Wales Branch continues to make a significant contribution to the communities of NSW with regard to water safety, resuscitation and first aid education and training throughout the 2010/2011 year. During this period Royal Life Saving NSW delivered on a range of initiatives resulting in safer aquatic environments, improved health outcomes, increased social capital and better policy outcomes.

These outcomes were achieved and delivered predominantly through the organisations courses, programs and health promotion campaigns. To assist Royal Life Saving reach a much wider market network it implemented a number of strategies during the 2010/2011 year. These included partnerships with:

- various media outlets who assisted in delivering key campaign messages to the broader community;
- like bodies to increase awareness of water safety, survival and resuscitation;

- schools to deliver curricula to students in order to up-skill them in water safety; and
- the aquatic and recreation industry to generate an increased culture of safety within the industry.

This association has greatly assisted with the development of programs and services to generate social capital and contribute to the building of water safety skills and knowledge of NSW constituents.

I am pleased to advise the Aquatic Safety Training Academy (ASTA) has passed its first anniversary. Message from the Chief Executive Officer

David Macallister



The 2010/2011 year has been another very busy year for the Royal Life Saving Society Australia New South Wales Branch and I am pleased to advise it has also been an extremely successful and productive year. The Society's fundamental aim is to prevent drowning and near drowning incidents and promote healthy, active lifestyles in the aquatic and recreation environment.

Through our research arm it is quite apparent there is no one reason why people drown, as there are so many varying factors, and therefore there is no one simple solution. For that reason, our approach needs to reflect the intricacy of the range of issues that result in drowning deaths and near drowning injury and needs to be able to adapt to any new complexity. To ensure our teachings get in touch with all Australians regardless of background and/or geographical location, it is important we tackle these goals using an all encompassing approach, designed to meet the needs of all community members' beliefs, ideals and values.

The Aquatic Safety Training Academy (ASTA) has been a major milestone for the New South Wales Branch when one assesses the growth and achievements of the Society. It has proven in its first year of operations that it will become a significant asset for the organisation, but more importantly, the ASTA has become a key training academy for the education and training of all Australians in water safety and associated activities. At the time of writing this report the ASTA has taught swim and survive techniques to over 3,500 children, trained in excess of 400 lifeguards, approximately 500 in lifesaving skills such as Bronze Medallion and more than 2,000 people in CPR and first aid as well as conducting numerous workshops in water safety, survival, rescue and resuscitation. Over 100 participants have achieved their Pool Operators qualification and a number of Aquatic and Recreation Industry forums have been held. Royal Life Saving Australia has used the facility to conduct national lifesaving sport coaches and officials' courses, research and development workshops on the Society's swim and survive, pool lifeguard and vocation and educational training programs. I am pleased to advise the Branch has also provided lifesaving programs to cultural and linguistically diverse communities including the Muslim, Korean, Indian and Australian Indigenous communities and have a number of programs being conducted to people with disabilities.



Inclusive of those programs being conducted out of the ASTA, together with the generic operations of the Royal Life Saving Society New South Wales Branch, including our much devoted volunteer network, I am pleased to advise the Society issued in excess of 253,000 certificates during 2010/2011. It is important to note that through our health promotion and public awareness campaigns, such as Keep Watch, it is estimated another 300,000 people received information in an effort to reduce the drowning and near drowning figures. It is our vision to equip all NSW residents with the capacity to become community lifesavers. Some statistics and key points that may be of interest to our members when looking at the number people attending Royal Life Saving courses during the 2010/2011 year are: over 100,000 children participated in swim and survive throughout the state; over 30,000 vocational and employment outcomes in the aquatic, sport and recreation sector were achieved; 3,500 examiners disseminate lifesaving skills, techniques and knowledge to NSW residents each year; a wide distribution of Keep Watch collateral across health and community sectors to address 0 – 5 age group drowning; 150 Keep Watch @ Public Pools partners and 61 Swim and Survive partner pools have been created. The Branch continues to be at the forefront with regard to water safety education and training with the expansion of the Aquatic Facility Safety Assessment program within the aquatic and recreation industry; the continual development (and redevelopment) of technological training and accreditation initiatives; and of course targeting 'black spot' drowning demographics and locations (such as 0 – 5 age group, older Australians, regional and remote communities, home swimming pools, high risk populations, effects of alcohol, high risk recreational activities, climate change and extreme weather, extending drowning prevention evidence and strengthening policies, legislation and standards relating to water safety, etc).

Royal Life Saving introduced a new initiative during the year that will assist with our drive and focus to achieve a 50% reduction in NSW drowning deaths by 2020. This is an ambitious undertaking, but one that Royal Life Saving believes is entirely achievable through a strong, collaborative community approach. Royal Life Saving together with our key partners would like to introduce Project Community Lifesaver. This initiative seeks to educate an additional 300,000 NSW residents in water safety, lifesaving, cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and first aid annually. We can make a difference. It is anticipated by participating in Project Community Lifesaver the Royal Life Saving network will provide valuable lifesaving skills and knowledge that will assist in preventing aquatic related injury and death and help achieve the 2020 reduction target. We will be encouraging our partners, clubs, schools, stakeholders, etc to be involved in Community Lifesaver and will provide kits, resources, fact sheets and wallet size information charts free of charge in an effort to save lives. This will be a big commitment for Royal Life Saving however it is felt that with a collaborative approach, we can make a difference.





The New South Wales Branch is proud to announce that the Royal Life Saving National Office introduced the new Swim and Survive program during 2010/2011. Swim and Survive is a well-known program that has been teaching Australian children swimming and water safety for over 25 years. To maintain Swim and Survive as the leading aquatic education program, it recently underwent a review process. Development included the re-branding of Swim and Survive, improved skill competencies, linking the award structure to promote learning throughout children's key life stages, and quality resources to support the program. Swim and Survive is now better than ever! Learning swimming and water safety skills is vital for every Australian child. Unfortunately the drowning statistics for children are unacceptably high and we need to provide children with a level of protection by equipping them with water safety skills and knowledge. The new Swim and Survive encompasses three programs; Wonder, Courage and Active. Within each program there is a series of awards to achieve and wonder, courage and active are linked to ensure a progression of skills through the key life stages. To assist in the delivery of the new swim and survive program, a new swim and survive Aquapak was released. The Aquapak is a fantastic teaching resource for swim and survive partners with key features including assessment guidelines, skill progression and tips, lesson plans together with games and activities for each level. Statistics reveal that 50,000 Australian children will not be able to swim fifty metres by the time they leave primary school and it is hoped that the new swim and survive program will have a positive effect on this alarming statistic.

During the past twelve months there have been some changes to the way Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation is taught in this country. The Australian Resuscitation Council (ARC) regularly reviews its guidelines and makes changes, however every five years as part of the International Liaison Committee on Resuscitation (ILCOR) there is a major review of the evidence for Resuscitation. The ARC participates in these reviews and upon their publication reviews its own policies to ensure they are best practice. I am pleased to report that Royal Life Saving, as a foundation member of ARC, was one of the first organisations in Australia to implement the new policies advising all examiners and instructors during the year.

I am pleased to report that the Society has made significant inroads in the Aquatic Industry Services arena. Ensuring the development of safety guidelines and risk management systems for all aquatic environments is essential in supporting a community to be safe around water. To highlight a number of achievements within this area I advise the following; 94 Aquatic Facility Safety Assessments were conducted including 42 in Sydney metropolitan and 52 in regional locations throughout NSW, there were 44 additional facilities that achieved the Society's 5 Star Water Safety Status, with five Aquatic Supervisor (Pool Operations) courses conducted in Sydney and a further four conducted in regional NSW with a total of 103 participants. These courses included participants from the Riverina district, Western and Northern NSW, South Coast, the Hunter as well as metropolitan Sydney.

In the Health Promotion area Royal Life Saving continued to provide information for public awareness campaigns, conduct vital research into drowning and near drowning incidents and target both the 'at-risk' groups and the cultural and linguistically diverse communities. Royal Life Saving's commitment to reducing water-related incidents and accidents is best seen through the concept of creating water-safe communities. Some achievements in this field included; the compilation of the annual drowning report, the distribution of over 50,000 Keep Watch resources to parents, carers, health professionals and the wider community, the compilation of the document 'Recreational fishing in NSW – an overview of drowning related fatalities and current practices', hosting a number of Active Family Fun Days and attending a number of workshops, seminars and conferences. We trained 350 year 6 students and 200 Indigenous children in CPR through a leadership program, there were 300 Home Pool Safety in a Box kits distributed free of charge to home pool owners, various Indigenous programs in pool lifeguarding, first aid, learn-to-swim and a water safety session held in Redfern for Indigenous students from remote Northern Territory communities. In addition we have conducted a number of programs for the Muslim and Korean communities.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those volunteers that donate their time educating their own community members and students in varying levels of lifesaving skills especially those members highlighted in this annual report receiving an honour who have been recognised by their peers. The New South Wales Branch realises the importance of its volunteers and the significant role they play in educating people throughout New South Wales in water safety, survival, rescue, resuscitation and first aid in an effort to reduce injury and loss of life through drowning and near drowning accidents. Each year these honours are awarded in an attempt to acknowledge the significant and tireless work carried out by the Society's volunteers to assist the Branch to reach its aims and objectives. Honours are issued at State, National and Commonwealth levels based on the

individuals dedication, commitment and years of service. The role of our volunteers, particularly our examiners, is extremely important and the services they provide tremendously valuable to the community. Each year the examiner network educates and trains thousands of individuals in key lifesaving skills that do, and have saved lives.

The success of Royal Life Saving is dependent on its committed and dedicated network, volunteer and professional workforce, sponsors, partners, supporting registered clubs, affiliated schools, partner pools, affiliated clubs and of course its modern and professional approach to its courses/programs. Our relationship with the NSW State Government is very strong and I thank the Premier, the various Ministers and various departments for their assistance and support. Later in this annual report the Society has paid tribute to all those associates in the acknowledgements page.

Royal Life Saving New South Wales Branch is active in all areas of the State. Our Regional Offices, Sub-Branches, members, volunteers, trainers, employees and lifesavers are found in all communities whether they are located in metropolitan, rural or remote areas. Our approach is inclusive and some of our biggest achievements occur away from large capital cities. I would like to personally thank all those people associated with the New South Wales Branch and look forward to a continued collaborative approach to saving lives in NSW.

In what proved to be a challenging year, growth throughout the Hunter and Central Coast regions remained steady. With the implementation of a number of new initiatives, increased demand for Safety Audit services and a very competitive market place, 2010/11 proved to be a very busy year for the Hunter Office.

It is pleasing to note that aquatic facilities across the region are placing significant importance in the Safety Audit process and the process by which each facility can improve their risk management systems and ultimately the safety of their facility. The Hunter Regional Office conducted 13 Pool Safety Audits during 2010/11 with 5 of these facilities gaining the 5 star rating. At the time of compiling this report, an additional 11 safety audits have been conducted with 4 of these facilities reaching 5 star status.

The strategic partnerships and working relationships with the local media, councils, schools and industry are continuing to grow and it is a priority of the Hunter Office to nurture, encourage and maintain these partnerships as they are vitally important to the operations of our office.

Illawarra Regional Office

The release of the drowning report shows that people are still losing their lives in and around the water - 18 in the Illawarra region of NSW accounting for 15.5% of drowning deaths in NSW - 17 males, 3 under the age of 24. There were 15 deaths that occurred in the 25 or older age groups, with a total of 5 in the 45-54 age group. Rock fishing and swimming contributed to 72% of fatalities, appealing to this age group of 25 year plus, bullet proof, male demographic is increasingly difficult. It is hoped that in the future the Illawarra can report that current strategies have led to a reduction of deaths, in the older males of the Illawarra.




Northern Regional Office Report

This year marks a significant era in the provision of Royal Life Saving services in the Northern Region.

We are creating a greater support network to implement the various programs that Royal Life Saving offers which allows increased access for the community to achieve a lifesaving skill or award.

Our projects aim to facilitate long-term delivery of our core programs in communities and to achieve this we apply the following approaches:

- We focus on community empowerment rather than service delivery. Programs aim to facilitate community participation to enable them to drive their own development.
- We build partnerships with local organisations and communities in order to enhance local capacity to sustain positive changes well beyond Royal Life Savings presence in a community.
- We aim to address a number of themes and often these overlap such as the Keep Watch @ Public Pools program (i.e., injury and drowning prevention, training and leadership skills).

The people of Royal Life Saving are its real strength. The Regional Office is very keen to continue to further develop our people and to improve the capacity of these people to deliver our programs to the wider community. We have some way to go in this journey and have commenced a recognition and retention program during the year which continues to gain momentum.

Our endorsed training centres allow for ease of access to training and accreditation as well as providing an essential link in delivering the vital water safety messages of Royal Life Saving.

Riverina Regional Office

Water, water everywhere but nor a drop to drink. Words from the "Rhyme of the Ancient Mariner" pretty well sum up the past twelve months of happenings within the Riverina Region of Royal Life Saving. Record rainfalls, floods, 20 cm of water through the regional office, throw in a mice plague and then add the standard events, all made for an interesting year in the Riverina.

Our VET programs that provide one of our core areas of existence have experienced growth, stability and decline in the last twelve months. Our three key VET areas are Austswim, First Aid and Pool Lifeguard programs. Regional Austswim course numbers declined this year, a trend which hopefully indicates a more stable workforce and not a decline in actual learn to swim teachers on the ground. The role of RLS is to make available these courses to the public and the regional office will continue to do so throughout its network of swimming centres and professional trainers. Our Pool Lifeguard enrolments have stabilised to where we have had constant numbers over the past three years. There has been a general trend that indicates stability in the industry for a couple of years followed by a significant changeover of personnel indicated by the increase in full courses and the similar decrease in re accreditation numbers. Due to the nature of the aquatic industry it is expected that this may continue with focus on total numbers the key criteria not the type of program being taken up. The most pleasing aspect of our VET numbers has been a rise in those participating in our Senior First Aid programs especially those participating in the First Aid online program or "First Aid in a Box". This method of learning has struck a significant chord in the market place, especially those who are "time poor" and require the flexibility and ease of completing a significant component at home prior to the assessment session. The use of elearning as a pathway to obtaining qualifications is now very much a part of our environment and it has assisted the Riverina office to provide more assessment option dates than previously offered. The development for other programs to move in this direction should be seen in a positive light and the need to keep exploring and developing new training and delivery options a must in an ever changing world.

During the past year the Royal Life Saving Riverina lost one of its most decorated and long serving members. Those fortunate to know Jack Misson, knew of his passion and commitment to the Royal Life Saving Society and its ideals and philosophies. From Broken Hill to Wagga Wagga and in between, Jack was a tireless worker in the fields of education and sport. He was a mentor to many and his passing will be profoundly missed by the community and lifesaving in general.

As always at this time we need to thank those who work tirelessly for the region and the organisation as a whole. We possess a dedicated but small team of professional trainers, a network of examiners and some key partners and stakeholders that assist us in keeping the business ticking along. Without these individuals or organisations we would not be in the strong position as a leading RTO that we are today. I would also like to acknowledge and thank the continued support from head office in Sydney, especially CEO David Macallister and Mick Ilinsky.

Finally, as we move towards the summer months I would like to encourage everyone to take particular care around all aquatic environments especially where young children are concerned so that we may work towards a significant reduction in preventable accidents.

Western Regional Office Report

Royal Life Saving experienced a great year in the Western Region during 2010/11 and our office was kept busy with courses and programs across a number of areas. Participation in our vocational courses continues to expand and this is supported by the dedicated volunteers working throughout our community and school networks. The introduction of the NSW Branch Regional and Remote Strategy has given direction and focus to the activities conducted in regional areas to ensure all areas of our operation are well supported. In addition to our core programs (lifesaving, lifeguarding, first aid and resuscitation), the Western Regional Office was involved in a number of different activities over the last twelve months and I shall use this opportunity to highlight some of them.

To kick off our busy period, the only affiliated lifesaving club in our area, the Wellington Amateur Swimming Club, received a gift of equipment from the RLS National Office to support their lifesaving activities. David Macallister (NSW Branch CEO) on behalf of the National Office, made the trip beyond the sandstone curtain to Wellington to present the group with their equipment. He also included a visit to Cudal Public School in his trip to present the students with the Swim & Survive awards they had gained through their school lifesaving program. It was a memorable occasion for a small school the size of Cudal to have David visit and present their awards!

The Swim and Survive Program itself underwent a revamp during the year with new levels added and modifications made to existing levels. Swim and Survive is a comprehensive swimming and water safety initiative of Royal Life Saving that seeks to increase the swimming and water safety skills of all Australian children in order to prevent drowning and increase participation in safe aquatic activity. With the launch of the revamped program the NSW Swim and Survive Partner Pool program was also refreshed with new members coming on board in Dubbo, West Wyalong, Grenfell, Lake Cargelligo, Boorowa, Oberon, Gilgandra, Blue Mountains (5 centres), Orange and Bathurst. These Partner Pools offer Swim and Survive as their primary learn to swim program to ensure a balanced, comprehensive instructional approach to a child's aquatic education. Partner Pools provide a pathway for ongoing learning and development through each of the key life stages and lessons are designed to keep children engaged, actively learning and, most importantly, having fun.

In support of the Regional and Remote Strategy, during 2010/11 we were able to offer training and services in a number of remote locations including lifesaving and lifeguarding training in Wilcannia and Weilmoringle, and the sale of a defibrillator to the small town of Enngonia. It is hoped that these training courses and resources in these locations will continue to be supported on an ongoing basis.

The Western Office worked on a number of programs with community based organisations during the year, including Austswim training for the National Aboriginal Sporting Chance Academy (NASCA), water safety activities for Uniting Care Burnside in Dubbo and the MERGE program in Orange. The MERGE holiday program is aimed at children from different ethnic backgrounds to help build life skills, teach tolerance and provide entertainment over the school holidays. We have been involved with the program on an ongoing basis and recently received CDSE funding from the Orange Ex-Services Club to provide the program with 60 CPR in a Box kits, which will be used during the summer holiday session.

To support the operation and management of safe aquatic facilities within the Western Region, I am pleased to say we are now able to offer the Aquatic Facility Safety Assessment (AFSA) to all facilities in our area. The Royal Life Saving AFSA is a comprehensive analysis of the policies, procedures, operations, and activities of a commercial swimming facility assessed against the Guidelines for Safe Pool Operations (GSPO), and other relevant legislation and standards via a venue inspection. The AFSA assesses all aspects of a facility including First Aid, Technical Operations, Facility Design, Supervision and Learn to Swim. These areas are assessed to determine their compliance against the relevant State and National Guidelines and Legislation. A detailed report and Safety Improvement Plan (list of recommendations) is developed following the inspection. During the last twelve months AFSAs were conducted for Orange, Dubbo, Narromine, Trangie, Blackheath and Bathurst pools, with Bathurst being recognised as a 5 Star Water Safety Partner for demonstrating a strong commitment to aquatic safety standards.



Our 'Courses in a Box': First Aid in a Box, CPR in a Box and Home Pool Safety (HPS) in a Box continue to prove popular, with the number of people choosing to learn first aid via the online course option increasing. We have entered into an arrangement with the campuses of Charles Sturt University in our area to offer the online first aid course option to their students at a reduced rate. The uptake of this has been promising and hopefully the word will spread across the campuses that ours is the best, simplest and most cost effective way to gain a first aid certificate! PoolWerx, who partner Royal Life Saving in our Keep Watch program also promote and onsell the HPS in a Box in the Dubbo area, helping to spread the word about the requirements to support a safe home pool environment.

There is much to look forward to over the coming year with the introduction of a full qualification, the Certificate III in Aquatics, soon to be available to the aquatics industry. Keep a look out for the Community Lifesaver Project, aiming to educate over 300,000 NSW residents in water safety, lifesaving and CPR in 2011/12. Information has already been distributed through the school network, next will be aquatic centres and community organisations. The Community Lifesaver Project aims to contribute to a 50% reduction in drowning deaths in NSW by the year 2020, so find out what you can do to get involved – visit www.communitylifesaver.org. We will also be conducting a number of local projects, focusing on the target areas of the Regional and Remote Strategy. In the Western Region this will include initiatives such as River Safety programs, Grey Medallion programs, Partner Pool initiatives and funding opportunities for small pools to access an AFSA for their centre. Whilst many of these programs and initiatives are driven from the office, many community members, school students and others experience Royal Life Saving's programs only through our trainers and volunteers. For all your efforts over the last twelve months I say thank you and keep up the great work! Thank you also to our Head Office staff and Board of Directors for your support and guidance throughout the year, and also to Nicola and Annabelle, our valuable Western Office staff who keep the ball rolling. We will continue to strive to provide a valuable service to the communities of the Western Region in the coming year.

Members of the general public were presented with Certificates of Commendation, Officers of the NSW Police Service were presented with the Police Service Award, an Officer of the Rural Fire Services was presented with the Rural Fire Service Award and Officers of the NSW Ambulance Service was presented with the Ambulance Award.

Isabella Taleski**

On 22 November, 2009, Isabella, her parents and her brother Stefan, were visiting a friend's home. There was a considerable amount of noise from children splashing and frolicking in the pool and adults talking.

Isabella left the pool to get a drink and, unnoticed by the adults supervising the children, Stefan slipped off the step and into the deep end of the pool. On her way back to the pool, Isabella saw her brother bobbing up and down in the water. Her father dragged the barely conscious Stefan out of the pool, Isabella's first thought was the lessons from her resuscitation class at St Gertrude's Primary School. She placed her brother on his side in the recovery position which allowed the water to drain from his lungs and cleared his airways which ultimately saved his life. She kept him in this position until emergency services arrived.

Isabella Taleski is to be highly commended for instinctively using the life saving skills she had recently learnt from participating in the Royal Life Saving Water Smart Program that undoubtedly saved her brother's life.

On 31 December, 2009 Tia Jade and her friends Colleen, Jesse and Kate were swimming in Kate's backyard pool.

Colleen was playing with a small basketball hoop in the deep end of the pool while Tia Jade was in the shallow end. She suddenly saw Colleen disappear under the water, apparently suffering an epileptic seizure causing her to lose consciousness. Tia Jade immediately swam to her aid, however by the time she was close to her, Colleen had sunk to the bottom of the pool. Tia Jade took a big breath and dived to the bottom of the pool, pulling the 12 year old to the surface. Colleen gasped for breath, unaware of what had just happened. Only 13 herself and similar in body weight, Tia Jade struggled to pull her friend to safety. "She was so heavy", she said afterwards, afraid that she might not have been able to help her.

High commendations are awarded to Tia Jade Currie. There is no doubt that her actions were paramount to the saving of Colleen's life and highlights the importance of everyone learning water safety.

On 27 April, 2009, Mia was at her part time job as a pharmacy assistant in Wahroonga when someone rushed in seeking help. 11 year old Madison Goodrick had just finished her first day back at school and was running for the train when she collapsed, falling to the ground unconscious.

Mia immediately ran to assist. She instructed an onlooker to phone for an ambulance and assessed Madison who was unconscious and bleeding from a head wound from the fall. When her heart stopped after about 4 minutes Mia began Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) until the paramedics arrived. Madison was diagnosed with hypertrophic cardiomyopathy, a thickening of the muscle between the two heart chambers. Often in young people, the first sign of this condition is sudden death. When the ambulance arrived, Mia continued to perform CPR – in the end for a total of over 8 minutes. After this period it was determined that they would need to use the external defibrillator on Madison to try to restart her heart. During this period Mia continued to render assistance and after several shocks Madison's heart started to beat. She was transported to hospital where she remained in Intensive Care for 5 days and when Madison awoke from her induced coma doctors were surprised there was no permanent brain damage, very rare in this diagnosis. All involved have said the only reason Madison is alive is because of the assistance rendered by Mia in the crucial first few minutes after Madison's heart stopped.

High commendations are awarded to Mia Leszinsky who diagnosed the problem and performed CPR by herself until help arrived all the time remaining calm in an horrific situation. Her swift, selfless actions definitely saved this little girl's life.

John Cucuk

On 4 March, 2009, John Cucuk, a welder from South Australia, was working on a new winery construction at Mudgee. Jouke Swiegers, a subcontracting electrician from Bathurst NSW, was working on an electrical distribution board in the new winery building.

During the course of the afternoon, John had been working in close proximity to Jouke at the eastern end of the shed. He had not seen or heard from him for about 20 minutes and decided to check on him. He found Jouke pale, cool to touch and with no pulse. It appears that whilst working on the distribution board, the safety switch had been overridden and he had come in contact with active points within the board. John summoned help and immediately commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) until emergency services arrived. Paramedics arrived on the scene and continued CPR and active resuscitation efforts. Jouke was subsequently escorted to Mudgee Hospital.

High commendations are awarded to John Cucuk for responding and without hesitation giving assistance in what must have been a very traumatic situation and attempting to save this man's life.

Helen Wallace, Michael Nobes and David D'Elboux

On 22 October, 2008, Helen Wallace and two of her children went to the business premises operated by her and her husband with the intention of wetting down a newly laid slab of concrete. On the site was a new fence with large gates that were to be automated however were not quite finished. Helen's husband was away in Orange at the time so Helen unlocked the new gates to gain access. Her son kicked his soccer ball over the fence and told her he was going to retrieve it. The gate was incomplete and "stoppers" had not been fitted which allowed the gate, once open, to continue sliding and fall away from the fence.

Shortly after, Michael Nobes was driving past and noticed the boy lying underneath the gate covered in a large amount of blood. He raised the alarm and lifted the gate to allow Helen to pull him out. Finding a weak pulse, Helen immediately commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and Michael phoned for emergency services. David D'Elboux, who was working directly across the road, ran to their aid. He assisted Helen with CPR and tried to stop the bleeding until the ambulance arrived. Due to the boy's condition, he was immediately transported via ambulance to Cowra Base Hospital and CPR continued to be performed on the way.

High commendations are awarded to Helen Wallace, Michael Nobes and David D'Elboux for performing under enormous pressure and applying every effort to save the life of this child. It is difficult to visualise a more stressful and traumatic situation.

Harry James Young Murphy

On 16 March, 2010 Harry arrived at school. As he was waiting for his friends to arrive, he observed a lady in the car park stagger and collapse to the ground. Harry immediately ran down to check on her and assessed that she was having a seizure.

Five months earlier, Harry had completed his Royal Life Saving First Aid Course as part of an Indigenous Academy program. The seizure lasted several minutes and the lady began to foam at the mouth. To minimise injury, Harry placed her in the recovery position, all the while supporting her and monitoring her condition. Two teachers came to assist which allowed Harry to call emergency services. He stayed on the line with emergency services until the ambulance arrived. The rescue lasted approximately 20 minutes and Harry also assisted staff with crowd control, support of other students and was the direct contact for emergency services.

Harry Murphy, who was only 14 at the time of the incident, is to be highly commended for demonstrating his newly learned First Aid skills and showing courage and community service in assisting the victim. Harry showed great presence of mind in a traumatic situation and undoubtedly prevented this person from suffering possible further injury.

On 30 July, 2010, Rebecca De Ruyter, an employee of "Dive Jervis Bay", was in a Supermarket in Vincentia whilst on her lunch break, when another customer collapsed at the check out.

Upon seeing the staff start to assess the patient, Rebecca went over to lend assistance and upon diagnosing a cardiac arrest, not only performed Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) on the patient but also co-ordinated the assistance of several of the staff until the arrival of emergency services. The initial ambulance response was a single on call officer, followed some time later by two off duty officers. During the time between the arrival of the first and second ambulance officers, Rebecca continued to perform CPR as well as assist in the intubation and defibrillation of the patient. The patient was stabilised and transported to Shoalhaven Hospital.

Rebecca De Ruyter is to be highly commended for her swift intervention action which improved the patient's potential outcome. This is an outstanding example of how First Aid knowledge can work to help patient outcomes within the community at times of sudden illness and injury.

At about 9.50 am on 10 January, 2009, Detective Senior Constable Christopher Ornatowski and Constable Daniel Walker responded to a call that a man had apparently suffered a heart attack on a house boat on the Hawkesbury River. He was on the top deck of the boat when he suddenly collapsed. His friend immediately contacted Simon McQuillan, the operator of the house boats, and flagged down Helmut Mondschein who was in a passing boat. When police arrived at the scene, they found Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) being performed by McQuillan and Mondschein. They took over CPR with Detective Ornatowski maintaining chest compressions and Constable Walker performing expired air resuscitation using a breathing apparatus on the male. They continued for approximately 5 minutes until Careflight personnel arrived and attempted defibrillation on the victim.

High Commendations are awarded to Detective Senior Constable Christopher Ornatowski, Constable Daniel Walker, Simon McQuillan and Helmut Mondschein for their quick actions and dedication in rendering life saving assistance in an attempt to save a fellow human being.

At approximately 9.00 pm on 20 October, 2009 Mudgee Police received a call alerting them that a young man had threatened to take his own life. He had sent a text message to a friend and also a family member indicating that he was going to find a tree from which to hang himself. A search of the area was immediately undertaken.

At about 11.00 pm, Senior Constable Cowden was searching Whitehouse Road, Gulgong when he observed the man hanging from a tree by the roadway. He immediately requested the assistance of ambulance and went to cut the man down. He quickly assessed the victim was not displaying any vital signs of life and without delay, commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) on his own while waiting for other police and ambulance to arrive. Senior Constable Weatherley arrived shortly after and aided Senior Constable Cowden by conducting expired air resuscitation with the use of a face mask. Constables Moore and Trembath arrived some minutes after and all four officers rotated CPR duties. Ambulance officers arrived about half an hour later and conducted a number of tests on the victim however he was unable to be resuscitated.

High Commendations are awarded to Senior Constable Matthew Cowden, Senior Constable Aaron Weatherley, Constable Nathan Moore and Constable Kevin Trembath. All the officers involved displayed a high level of professionalism in trying circumstances. Though it may have been apparent to them that the victim was beyond recovery, they continued continuous CPR efforts 15 – 20 minutes until the arrival of the ambulance.

Former Senior Constable Kylie Brooks and Former Senior Constable Joshua Higgs***

On Friday, 5 December, 2008, Senior Constables Kylie Brooks and Joshua Higgs were attending Forbes Local Court as part of their duties. About 10.30 am a member of the community approached them advising that a man had collapsed in the library next door. Both officers attended the library and called for an ambulance. On arrival they found an elderly male to be unconscious with no pulse.

Senior Constables Brooks and Higgs immediately commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) without the protection of a mask. They continued CPR until the ambulance arrived and took over, conveying the man to Forbes District Hospital.

High Commendations are awarded to Former Senior Constable Kylie Brooks and Former Senior Constable Joshua Higgs. They were quick to react and assess the situation and even though they did not have a mask with them, commenced CPR without concern for themselves in an effort to revive the person. This incident clearly shows the police officers doing very positive and respected work within the community.

On Monday, 5 October, 2009, Constable Mitchell Corfield responded to a motor vehicle accident in which a car travelling through a 40 km school zone crashed through 2 residential fences before coming to rest in a front yard. An elderly man was in the driver's seat and appeared to be unconscious without a pulse. It was later established that the driver had started to go into cardiac arrest whilst stationary at an intersection. His wife had attempted to exit the vehicle to go to his help, however as she opened the door, he accidentally pressed his foot on the accelerator and she was thrown from the vehicle as it accelerated and sped through the intersection, a road sign and two fences.

With the aid of another police officer, Constable Corfield removed the man from the vehicle and placed him on the ground. He commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and an attending ambulance officer attached an air bag to supply the patient with air. After approximately 10 minutes, a weak pulse was felt. Other ambulance officers arrived at the location and the patient was placed on a stretcher and conveyed to Walgett Local Hospital. It was confirmed that the elderly man had suffered a cardiac arrest and would need further treatment at a specialist hospital. After a stay in hospital, he made a full recovery.

Constable Mitchell Corfield is to be highly commended for his professionalism and swift intervention which resulted in the patient making a full recovery.

On 23 July, 2008, Michael Berthune was walking across the Fraton Bridge over the Clarence River with his family. He noticed some clothing and saw a note written by a woman who was intending to cause harm to herself. He looked over the bridge and saw an elderly woman in the water, with a young boy trying to help her. Michael, who suffers from an illness himself, immediately ran below the bridge and with no regard for his own safety, entered the freezing water, swimming out to help. The two youths struggled against the current to keep the female afloat; the water was freezing and the woman was a dead weight and was threatening to pull both the boys under.

Responding to a call for assistance, Senior Constable Philip Benfield was the first policeman on the scene. He ran towards the voices of the two boys who were now in a panic as they struggled to hold her above the water. He forced his way through 10-15 metres of high dense reeds and mud in order to reach them. Senior Constable Daniel Wills was the second officer in the water. He removed his appointments and shirt and dived into the water slightly upstream to avoid the reeds and swam 20 metres to their location. He was able to assist in getting the woman out of the flowing river and into the safety of the reeds. Senior Constable Ann Cook also entered the river downstream and swam fully clothed in the freezing river. She provided assistance by carrying the woman's legs as she was removed from the water. The officers quickly assessed the patient's condition and treated her until the ambulance arrived.

High Commendations are awarded to Michael Berthune and Senior Constables Benfield, Wills and Cook, each of whom had a different involvement and level of risk during this rescue. This elderly woman, who could not swim, would most certainly have lost her life without the courageous actions of all these people.

At about 1.30pm on Tuesday, 5 May, 2009 Leading Senior Constables Karen Hector and Allan Sangalang were on patrol in Kingswood when they were approached by a member of the public and told there was a man lying in the gutter who appeared to be unconscious. They drove around the corner and observed a number of people gathered around a male victim lying on his side in the gutter. He appeared to be blue/purple and was not responsive or moving. After assessing that there was no trace of vital signs, they immediately commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and after a short time, the victim started to make gurgling noises and a faint pulse was detected fading in and out. They continued CPR until ambulance officers arrived who attached defibrillator pads and injected the patient with various stimulants. After about 15 minutes, he started to come around and his skin regained a normal colour. Ambulance officers persuaded him to be conveyed to hospital for further checks as he could easily relapse into an unconscious state.

High Commendations are awarded to Leading Senior Constables Karen Hector and Allan Sangalang. Their professional actions were instrumental in saving the victim's life.

***New South Wales Police Award presented to:
Sergeant David Watson, Senior Constable Ashley Tucker and Senior
Constable Troy Bulpett***

About 12 midday on Sunday 17 May, 2009 police conducting a patrol of a reserve in South Penrith on police trail bikes discovered two unconscious, possibly deceased, males lying face down and immediately called for assistance. A short time later, Sergeant David Watson and Senior Constables Tucker and Bulpett arrived at the scene. Sergeant Watson immediately commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) on one of the victims, assisted by Senior Constables Tucker and Bulpett and an ambulance officer who had just arrived. During this time the other police officers maintained a crime scene, conducted a canvass for possible witnesses and assisted the other ambulance officer with first aid to the second victim. Upon receiving treatment and a number of injections of adrenalin, he responded to first aid and commenced normal breathing. The first victim was able to breathe by himself for a short period, however relapsed into unconsciousness and CPR was recommenced by ambulance officers. Both victims were taken from the scene by ambulance with police maintaining a crime scene until the arrival of investigators and crime scene police. It was apparent that what had happened was a drug overdose. Both victims were transported to Nepean Hospital.

High commendations are awarded to Sergeant David Watson and Senior Constables Ashley Tucker and Troy Bulpett who all carried out their duties exceptionally well during this situation and assisting with CPR for at least 20 – 25 minutes. The location of this incident was a public reserve and police ensured that these actions being carried out which were of a traumatic nature, were viewed by limited persons for a limited amount of time, thus restricting possible harm to other members of the public.

On 21 August, 2009, Sergeant David Watson and Senior Constable Christopher Miller whilst patrolling the Kingswood Park shops were stopped by a store keeper who informed them a male had collapsed in his store.

Police entered the fruit shop where the man was found collapsed on the floor and checked him for vital signs. Finding no pulse, they commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) on the patient, with Sergeant Watson performing expired air resuscitation without the use of breathing apparatus or mask and Senior Constable Miller performing external cardiac compressions. This was continued until Senior Constable Miller indicated he could detect a pulse and the elderly man took a breath. Ambulance officers then arrived at the location and conveyed him to Nepean Hospital where he was admitted to the Intensive Care Unit.

Sergeant David Watson and Senior Constable Christopher Miller are to be highly commended for their courageous efforts in assisting this elderly man. Their actions showed great leadership, initiative, professionalism and compassion in a difficult situation.

Leading Senior Constable Paul McCann, Senior Constable Garry Baker

On Thursday, 11 December, 2008, Leading Senior Constable Paul McCann was on Highway Patrol Duties with another policeman when they heard a radio message regarding a number of swimmers in distress at Mollymook beach. Answering the message they drove to the beach.

A family, who were renting a holiday home for a week, had gone to the beach in the afternoon for a swim. While the parents watched, two of the sons took their boards into an unpatrolled section of the beach where there were no other swimmers. They quickly got into difficulty as they were caught in a rip and became distressed when one board was lost. The father, seeing his sons in trouble, stripped down and entered the water. A short time later, the boys, although extremely fatigued, managed to reach a point where they could stand and made it to safety. The father however was caught in the rip. Two surfboard riders went to his assistance and Leading Senior Constable McCann ran down to the edge of the water where the surfers were trying to bring the victim in face down on one of their boards. He ran into the water up to his waist to help. The victim appeared to be unconscious, lifeless and blue. On the beach he immediately commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and one of the young sons began expired air resuscitation. After a short time, water and vomit came from the victim's mouth. Senior Constable Keft wiped the victim's mouth and immediately took over the expired air resuscitation. Ambulance officers arrived at the scene and checked the vital signs of the victim. The officers continued CPR while the ambulance officers administered drugs and connected a defibrillator to the victim. After some time, Senior Constable Baker took over chest compressions and continued until ambulance officers attempted defibrillation of the victim.

High commendations are awarded to Leading Senior Constable Paul McCann, Senior Constable Garry Baker and Senior Constable John Keft who worked as a team in trying conditions in an attempt to save this person's life.

***New South Wales Police Award presented to:
Senior Constable Michael Werren and Senior Constable Dean Murray***

On Friday, 3 August, 2007, Senior Constable Michael Werren and Senior Constable Dean Murray were on patrol in the Guildford area when they answered a call over the radio to attend the Guildford TAB. Staff there believed a patron to be drug affected and called police to move him along.

Upon arrival they saw a male person lying in the recovery position on the floor of the TAB. He was unconscious and it was established he had been in this state for a period of 10 minutes, although numerous patrons were present and witnessed the collapse, no life saving methods had been attempted or commenced. The Senior Constables immediately checked the vital signs of the victim which revealed he was in a state of cardiac arrest and they commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR). They continued CPR until the arrival of ambulance officers who continued medical treatment utilising other methods of resuscitation and subsequently conveyed him to Westmead Hospital.

High Commendations are awarded to Senior Constables Michael Werren and Dean Murray for their determination and precise actions in attempting to save the life of a fellow human being.

***New South Wales Police Award presented to:
Senior Constable Jared Mildenhall and Senior Constable Adam Kendall***

On 7 September, 2008, Jared Mildenhall, an off duty Senior Constable with the Public Order and Riot Squad was travelling north along the F3 Freeway when the traffic conditions suddenly altered from free flowing to a slow crawl. Rounding a bend he saw a car impaled on the median strip safety barrier and immediately pulled over to offer assistance.

There were a few people standing around, obviously distressed and a person still in the back of the car. On the ground was a tarpaulin and as he pulled it back discovered a female underneath it. He was approached by a man claiming to be a doctor who advised that the person was deceased. Senior Constable Mildenhall then went to check on the man still in the vehicle who advised that he was OK. At this time, Senior Constable Adam Kendall arrived on the scene and Senior Constable Mildenhall explained his observations to him. Together they pulled back the tarpaulin and noticed that the female was making slight movements. It was determined that she had been thrown from the vehicle on impact and was twisted in the seat belt. They cut her free and together with two other bystanders moved her into a lying position. By this time, ambulance officers had arrived and inserted an airway tube into her mouth to assist her breathing and shone a torch into her eyes testing for a reaction. They commented that there had been "no reaction" to the light, however the officers involved had indeed observed a reaction and when the ambulance officer checked again they confirmed this. A neck brace was placed on her and an oxygen mask was held to her badly injured face. Senior Constables Jared Mildenhall and Adam Kendall assisted placing her in the ambulance which drove to where a rescue helicopter had landed to convey her to hospital.

High Commendations are award to Senior Constables Jared Mildenhall and Adam Kendall. If it was not for the professional policing displayed by these officers, the young female passenger would not have received the immediate medical treatment that she required and could have become a fatality. The female passenger did recover from her injuries.

Paul Berry and Harry West are builders who had been employed to do building work on a property at Burren Junction in western NSW. They had been there for about 3 months and were living in a workman's cottage on the property. There was a fenced inground pool on the property that normally was covered, however this day the cover had been blown off by the severe wind. The owners of the property had three children aged 7, 5 and 3. On 21 August, 2007, Paul and Harry were about to pack up for the day when Harry heard a distressed scream from the owner's wife. He ran around the house and saw her coming out of the pool area and the little girl lying on the side of the pool. Harry jumped the fence and found that the little girl was not breathing. Paul ran in and immediately turned her on her side into the recovery position to clear her airways. She was cold and was blue around the mouth, not responsive and he could not feel a pulse. The mother raced inside to grab the phone and handed it to Harry to call emergency services. Paul commenced Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and Harry was speaking with the 000 operator and trying to reassure the mother who was going into shock. Harry relieved Paul with the CPR for a short while and then police arrived and not long after the ambulance arrived who took over. They conveyed her to hospital and continued CPR all the way.

High Commendations are awarded to Paul Berry and Harry West for responding and without hesitation giving assistance and comfort in what must have been a very traumatic situation and attempting to save the life of this child.

***Rural Fire Service Award presented to:
Acting Fire Mitigation Officer Bronwyn Waters***

On 11 August, 2008 Acting Fire Mitigation Officer Bronwyn Waters, a member of the Dumaresq Rural Fire Brigade, was returning to the Fire Control Centre on the New England Highway when she came upon an horrific motor vehicle accident. Four persons were badly injured and one male had been thrown out the rear window of one vehicle and had landed some 150 metres away from the scene and down a steep embankment. Bronwyn stopped her vehicle and immediately took control of the scene. She directed the bystanders at the scene to slow down oncoming traffic, and called emergency services. She then went to the male who had been thrown from the vehicle to render first aid and assistance. The male was severely injured and Bronwyn performed Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and other first aid measures for approximately twenty minutes until an ambulance arrived and took over attending to the male.

High Commendations are awarded to Acting Fire Mitigation Officer Bronwyn Waters whose actions were outstanding and in line with the best traditions of the Rural Fire Service.

***Ambulance Service Award presented to:
Paramedic Crewman Graeme Goodwin***

On 4 April, 2010 Paramedic Crewman Graeme Goodwin responded to a report a fisherman that had been washed off the rocks along with two Police Officers who had entered the water to attempt a rescue in extreme sea conditions. This rescue was conducted at night in poor weather conditions as well as poor visibility due to rain, lack of natural light and turbulent water along with fogging of the dive mask and water washing over and into the snorkel. Paramedic Crewman Goodwin entered the water via a winch from the helicopter in extreme 6 metre waves to rescue three persons. He experienced great difficulty in attaching the harness to an unconscious patient and was subjected to a violent flat spin on the winch cable during the extrication of the first patient who weighted 100kg plus. Management of the winch cable in the dark choppy waters also proved to be a constant hazard, at times becoming entangled around patient and paramedic as they were battered by the swell and waves. During the winch up to the aircraft with the patient in the harness the Paramedic Crewman Goodwin encountered an extreme spin, at times so extreme that he was in a horizontal position, making management of the patient extremely difficult. He became completely disorientated and believes he may have blacked out due to the force of the spin.

The pilot and winch operator found it difficult to control the spin and elected not to recover the paramedic and patient to the aircraft. Instead they flew the aircraft to the shoreline and continued to fly with them hanging below the helicopter to a landing area 100 metres away. Despite the fact that the paramedic was dazed and disorientated he reunited with the helicopter crew about a minute later as there were still two police officers in the water who required his assistance.

High Commendations are awarded to Paramedic Crewman Graeme Goodwin. His actions are testimony of his skill, strength and tenacity in attending a rescue in dire circumstances.

***Ambulance Service Award presented to:
Intensive Care (SCAT) Paramedic Gregory Kirk***

On 27 September, 2009, most of NSW was affected by very strong winds making it hazardous for small aircraft to fly safely around Sydney and the Blue Mountains. Paramedic Gregory Kirk was assigned to Ambulance Rescue Helicopter Rescue 24 to rescue two Japanese bushwalkers who had become lost in the Blue Mountains. The crew departed Bankstown airport, however had to return, unable to complete the rescue due to the severe turbulence throwing the aircraft around. A second attempt was made to reach the bush walkers as well as two ground response crewmen who had found the bushwalkers. Due to the turbulence the aircraft was continually thrown around and had to fly away from the tree canopy several times to ensure the safety of the aircraft and crew. The patients were finally winched to safety.

Paramedic Kirk has demonstrated significant bravery through his actions while completing the winch rescue of two bushwalkers in extreme weather conditions. The two bushwalkers were ill prepared for their venture, it was snowing and they were being buffeted by very high winds. By agreeing to undertake this mission Paramedic Kirk knew it would be very difficult and dangerous, but continued anyway. He was presented with a 70ft winch through a narrow opening in the tree canopy in 85 klm per hour winds from an unstable aircraft. The risks of winching in these conditions are significant as any change in wind conditions can lead to a loss of control of the aircraft. He performed the first winch without event, however whilst preparing to leave the aircraft door for the second patient the helicopter succumbed to the weather and was forced to fly away to avoid catastrophic incident. He completed the second winch successfully once the pilot was able to reposition the aircraft over the winch site. Paramedic Kirk showed great courage and composure when completing the second winch.

Intensive Care Paramedic Gregory Kirk is to be highly commended for showing great courage and composure in these very hazardous conditions. His actions on this day far exceeded that expected by the Ambulance Service of NSW when performing his role.

Sub-Branches

BALRANALD AND DISTRICT

As mentioned in my previous reports, the Balranald Central School, business houses, agencies, Balranald Shire Council, the Lions Club serves the rural community with a variety of programs and funding to cater for the children and adults.

The Balranald Shire Council provided Resuscitation equipment to run courses for school children and the community. The Resuscitation Awareness Program was introduced to school aged primary students from K-6 classes for the first time in 2010. This was a part of the PDHPE program. The program was a successful event with Kindergarten students learning how to dial emergency numbers.

Last year the NSW Department of Education provided funding to run a Learn to Swim Program for students who were not able to swim. The program provided students with Austswim Teachers to give one-on-one tutoring.

The RLSSA incentive is to encourage parents and students to enroll up-front before the H2o swimming program begins in December 2011 and 2012. This assists in the administration and ensuring students, parents and community are utilizing the service of the Balranald Sub-Branch.

During this year the Balranald Central School is offering to run courses regarding Resuscitation and Emergency Care before the summer swimming programs commence. The RLSSA Sub-Branch will organise First Aid courses for Yr 11 and Yr 12 students. The Sub-Branch is also offering Bronze Medallion courses for community members, teachers and other interested persons who would benefit from the opportunity.

The Branch promotes the use of Keyring masks and First Aid Kits. The Branch also offers free yearly First Aid Kit checks and items replaced to the value of \$10.00.



Unfortunately it transpired that their rescue and resuscitation skills were needed and tested for real when a swimmer suffered a heart attack whilst swimming. Their quick and competent response revived him on site but sadly he later died in a Sydney hospital.

We look forward to next year and continued awareness of the work of our trainers in this important aspect of community safety.







Rachelle King, Tim Schofield, Andrew Bowden (captain) and Jane Cooper were all selected on the Aussie Barras (National team) to compete at the Commonwealth Championships in Durban, Sth Africa in September.
